At Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor
January – August 2018

January 1~31 — Buy One Get One Free Month. February 3 – Celebrating Black History Month, 1 – 3:45 pm: Screening of the motion picture "Hidden Figures." Co-sponsored by the Hawaii Council for the Humanities, the screening will include a presentation by Dr. Allison Paynter of Chaminade University, hosted Q&A session and discussion of the movie's theme. Event is free to Museum members and free with Museum admission. Limited seating, advance registration is encouraged.

February 16 – Chinese New Year Lion Dance, 1 – 2 pm: Help us welcome in the Year of the Dog with Sing Yung Dragon and Lion

Dance Association blessing our hangars. We'll have the red envelopes for you to feed the lions as they roam our campus, bringing us all good luck for the Lunar New Year.

March 3 – Open Cockpit Day Honoring Women in Aviation & Aerospace, 10 am – 4 pm: Event will feature pilots, ground crew, military volunteers, and women pilots commemorating Women in Aviation and Women's History Month. Guests will meet and talk with aviators who share their love of aviation. Wally Funk, one of the Mercury 13 (women who trained for the space program in the early '60s but were not allowed to participate) and the first female air safety investigator for the NTSB, will be the featured speaker. Wally Funk presentation will be in the Museum Theater at 1:30pm. Event is free to Museum members and students ages 18 years and under, and free with Museum admission.

March 21-23 – Explorers Club: STEM camp for grades 3-5, featuring hands-on activities that promote collaboration, critical thinking, and problem solving. Program cost is \$240 (\$210 for Museum members), and covers lunches, snacks, t-shirt, and all materials.

June 2-3 – 11th Biggest Little Airshow in Hawaii, 10 am – 4 pm: Each year, thousands of visitors visit Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor on Ford Island to see some of the nation's best remote control aircraft pilots perform aerial stunts and dog fights with giant scale warbirds, jets, and helicopters. There's also a candy drop, activity zone and 'snow field' for the kids; aircraft displays; prize drawings; and hangar tours. Award winning pilots from Warbirds West and Take Stock In America/Flying Tigers Paratroop Team will team up with Hawaii Remote Control clubs to showcase their skills. Students, ages 13 – 15, (or graduates of the Museum’s Flight School) will discover the ways aviation has transformed Hawaii and the Pacific region over the past century. Campers will work together to enhance teamwork, problem solving, and critical thinking. Overnight stay on the USS Missouri Battleship Memorial. Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor is located on Historic Ford Island, where bombs fell during the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941. Visitors to the Museum can see remnants from that day of infamy, including the 158-foot tall, red and white iconic Ford Island Control Tower, Hangars 37 and 79, and bullet holes in Hangar 79. Through its preservation and restoration of World War II fighter

planes and accompanying artifacts in the Museum's historic hangars, Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor shares the story of the vital role aviation played in the winning of World War II, and its continuing role in maintaining America's freedom.

Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor is a 501(c) (3) non-profit organization. Its mission is to develop and maintain an internationally recognized aviation museum on Historic Ford Island that educates young and old alike, honors aviators and their support personnel who defended freedom in The Pacific Region, and to preserve Pacific aviation history.
